Our founding donor and naming partner, Al Osten passed away at the age of 95 on January 23rd, 2026. In 2023, Al lost his partner Buddy Victor of 65 years who died just five days from his 93rd birthday.

Born in Saskatoon, on January 9, 1931. Soon after he was born, Al and his family moved to Edmonton where he grew up. Osten fell in love with the arts community, ultimately moving to Toronto to pursue his dream of a career in show business. Al and Buddy met in 1957, when Buddy joined the Rover Boys, a doo-wop group. Their hit song "Graduation Day" became a Top 20 school on the US hit chart. The Rover Boys went on to perform on the Tonight Show at Radio City Music Hall, opened for Tony Bennett in Atlantic City, and performed on Dick Clark's American Bandstand. They also performed in Las Vegas. Al Osten & Buddy Victor have also been credited for discovering legendary Canadian singer Paul Anka.

In 1967, Buddy and Al pursued an opportunity to invest in an up-and-coming business opportunity, Weight Watchers. In doing so, they purchased the Alberta Weight Watchers franchise and later the Saskatchewan franchise. They subsequently sold the business in 2013. As a result of their good fortune and success, Al and Buddy, have had the opportunity to support various charitable organizations, including Pilgrims Hospice, the Art Gallery of Alberta, the Victor-Osten Foundation and Alzheimer's Society in Edmonton, as well as the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre, Theatre Calgary, and the Osten-Victor Foundation in Calgary, to name a few.

During the planning of our Tennis Centre, our Board Chair and founder, Ron Ghitter encouraged Al and Buddy to donate to our tennis centre. Despite never playing tennis or having much interest in the sport. Al Osten & Buddy Victor's donation helped pave the way for the construction of the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre in Calgary. Since opening its doors in 2016, the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre has become the crown jewel for Canadian Tennis, servicing nearly 50,000 Albertans year. Since 2016, the Centre has won over 20 industry awards and has become a beacon of inclusive and accessible tennis in Alberta.

"Al and Buddy were dear friends of my wife Myrna and me. Without their generous financial and spirited support, the enormously successful Osten Victor Alberta Tennis Centre in all likelihood, would never have come into being. We are immensely grateful for their friendship and support. Their legacy of generosity and philanthropy will be an inspiration", said Ron Ghitter, ATC Founder and Director.

Our board and team offer our heartfelt condolences to Al Osten's friends and family. Al contributed greatly to Alberta and will be deeply missed. On behalf of all of us at the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre, thank you Al, a life well lived.

This May, we are proud to mark the 10th anniversary of the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre. This significant milestone reflects our commitment to advancing the sport and enhancing recognition for the tennis community in Alberta and across Canada.

Managing a tennis facility presents significant challenges, yet the team has consistently surpassed the expectations set by our Board. I would like to formally acknowledge the ongoing dedication of our CEO, Danny Da Costa, along with his colleagues at the ATC. Under Danny's leadership, the staff diligently balance the requirements of our members, customers, and stakeholders daily. It is widely regarded that the ATC, is among the best tennis facilities in Canada, and one of the top community-based facilities in the tennis industry.

Our ongoing success is thanks to our dedicated members and customers, whose support has been crucial to our achievements. Your commitment to the ATC over the past decade has paved the way for our Phase 3 expansion, which will provide more court time for both public and general use.

We're excited about our expansion plans but recognize the substantial effort needed to secure funding. We remain optimistic that, with support from our members, customers, stakeholders, the tennis community, and corporate Calgary, we will obtain the necessary funding to begin construction.

I want to express my gratitude for the commitment shown by our Board Chair, Al Fowler, and our dynamic and diverse team of volunteer directors. I'm also proud of our outstanding staff, who work every day to deliver the level of service needed to uphold our facility's high standards.

On a personal note, I am greatly saddened by the recent passing of my close friend, Al Osten. We also lost Buddy Victor, Al's long-time partner, a few years ago. Both Buddy and Al were valued friends to me and my wife Myrna. Their generous contribution to our centre made it possible for the ATC to begin; without their support, this achievement might never have happened. MESSAGE FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Dear Members, Program Participants & Stakeholders,

I want to sincerely thank all our members, participants, partners, and key stakeholders for their essential contributions to another successful year at the OSTEN & VICTOR Alberta Tennis Centre (ATC). As we move forward, our organization is making a growing impact in both tennis and the wider sporting community throughout Canada.

I celebrated ten years as CEO of the ATC in 2025. Guiding the centre from its beginning and watching it become one of Canada's leading tennis facilities has been an honour. Looking back over the last decade, I am very proud of everything we have achieved. We have fostered a culture rooted in excellence and offered top-tier facilities, programs, and events. Most importantly, I am proud of how our centre positively affects our community, enriching the lives of everyone who comes through our doors each day.

The past year marked significant change for ATC. After hosting the 5th Calgary National Bank Challenger, we chose to discontinue the event due to economic uncertainty, court constraints, and our focus on facility expansion. We also completed our 2025–2030 strategic plan, built around Building the Game, Playing the Game, and Staying in the Game. ATC is on track to achieve its 2026 objectives. The immense popularity and demand for tennis in our facility, resulted in a conscious effort to reduce our internal membership quota. We closed our membership and created a membership waiting list. These changes, along with other changes to programming and scheduling improved access to court time (regular and non-member play).

Our players continue to impress. Cleeve Harper reached #82 in ATP doubles, joined Canada's Davis Cup Team (2-0 vs. Israel), debuted at a Grand Slam with a match win, and finished as Canada's top doubles player. Juniors Zimo Bai placed 8th at U14 Nationals; Matthew Popa earned 3rd in U14 singles, finalist in doubles, and won U12 outdoor doubles. ATC athletes Alexia Jacobs (University of Washington) and Hailey Murphy (Texas Tech) both qualified for NCAA Championships and hold NCAA singles and doubles rankings.

Our team at ATC continues to motivate and nurture players of every age and skill level, achieving impressive outcomes both on and off the court. Here's a summary of our 2025 accomplishments:

- More than 50,000 visitors came to the ATC for programs, services, and events.
- Tennis instruction and programming reached 20,000 Albertans.
- Court usage was strong, averaging 83% annually and peaking at 90% during the busiest season.
- We hosted 22 provincial, national, and international events
- 2,500 children joined our school tennis program this year, bringing the total to 67,500 since 2016.
- We employed 44 coaches, with 11 new hires this period.
- 20 training and development opportunities were offered to the team
- \$75,000 in funding supported tennis growth and community events through various organizations.
- We partnered with 30 community groups to make tennis more affordable and accessible.
- ATC Team and Board Members received 6 national awards for their contributions.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

We are committed to expanding tennis in our community by supporting equity and offering inclusive programs. As part of the City of Calgary's Sport Hub Program, we delivered more than 120 classes across four neighbourhoods: Forest Lawn, Shawnessy, Dover, and Huntington Hills. Collaborating with Tennis Alberta and the Calgary Tennis Society, we hosted the Black Girls in Tennis (BGIT) event at the ATC, providing court space, coaches, and female youth mentors. Our school program continues to offer affordable tennis access in Calgary, with 2,500 participants expected in 2025—raising our total to 67,500 since 2016. In addition, we support players from under resourced communities and newcomer families through the Friends of Ron Ghitter Fund and Everyone Can Play Program. At our Centre, an inclusive approach to tennis development ensures that people of all ages, abilities, and backgrounds can continue to enjoy the sport.

Our Board and Management have been working behind the scenes to acquire the adjacent lands to the south to expand our facilities, creating a 'campus style facility' for tennis players to enjoy the sport in Alberta. We remain hopeful that our facility development project will advance in early 2026 with construction to begin in late 2026. The next phase of our Facility Development Plan will allow us to achieve continued growth while creating more opportunities for public access and member play.

I would like to extend my appreciation to our Board of Directors, members, and program participants for their ongoing support of our Tennis Centre. I also wish to acknowledge our entire team for their dedication and significant contributions throughout the past year. Our achievements are a direct result of their commitment, professionalism, and leadership. The team embodies the values and mission of our Tennis Centre, ensuring that ATC maintains its position as one of Canada's premier tennis facilities.

Over the last nine years, we have established an organization that consistently surpasses expectations and delivers exceptional experiences and events for our members and the broader tennis community. As we approach our tenth anniversary in 2016, we remain committed to supporting and fostering the growth of tennis within Alberta.

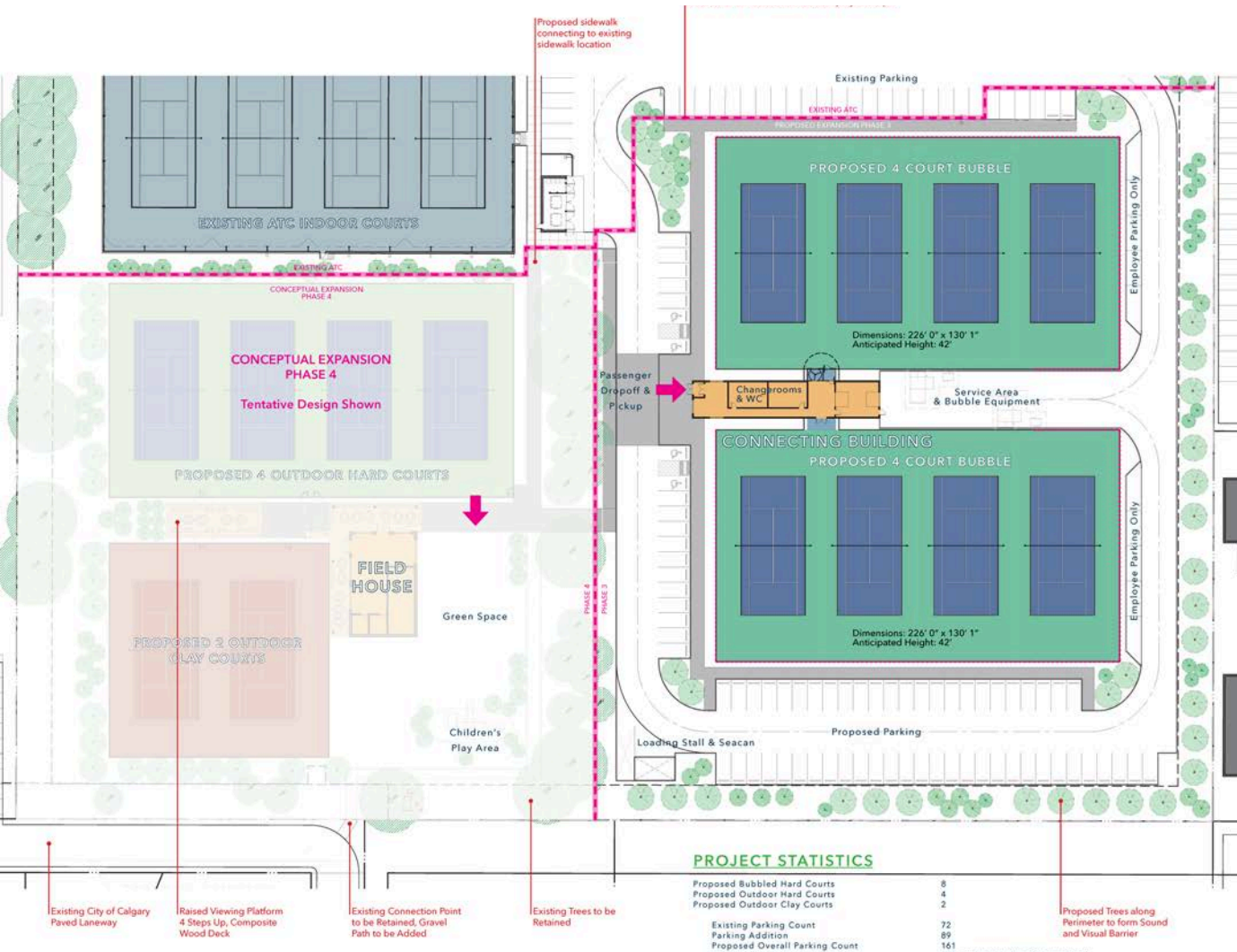

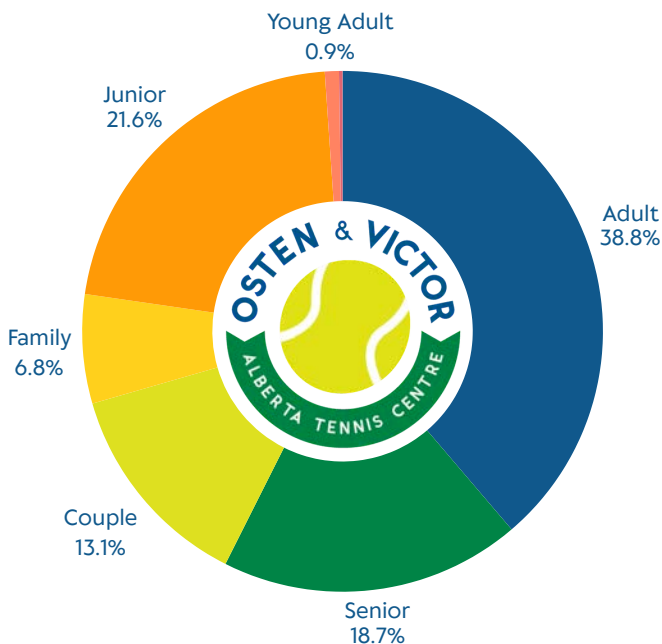

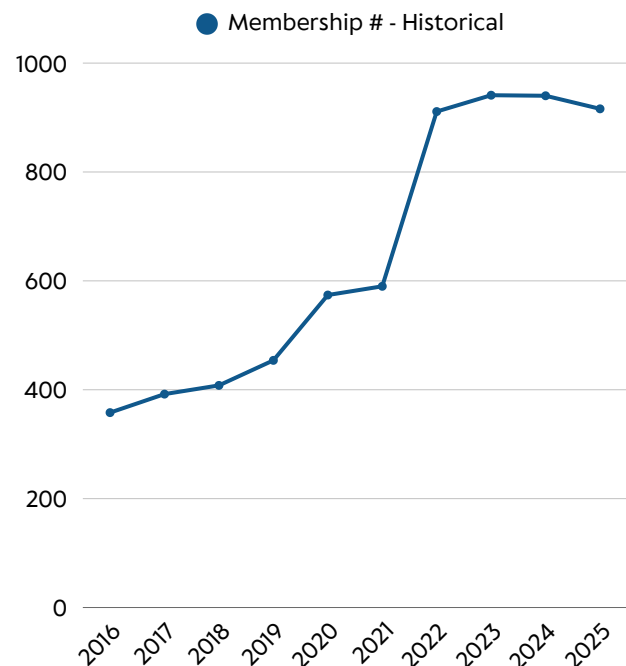

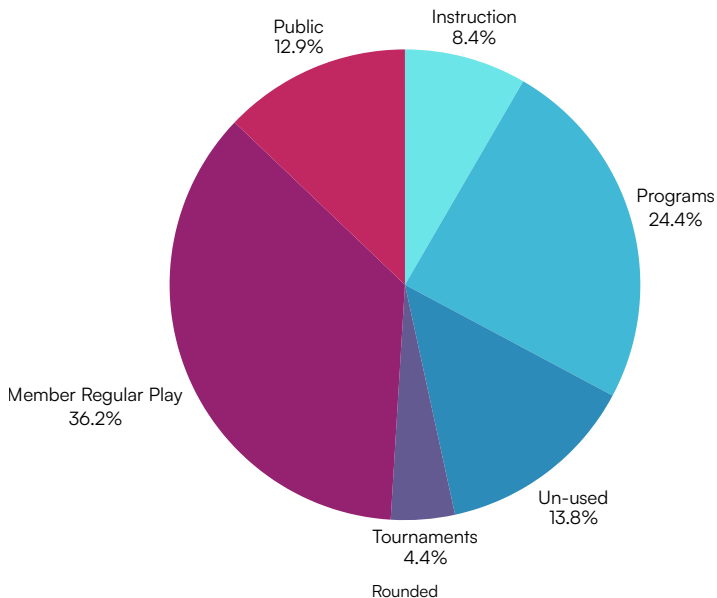

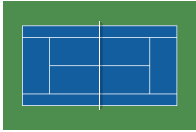

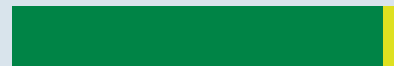

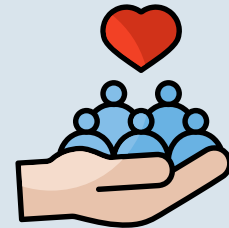

Our Phase 4 development will create new public amenities and additional seasonal tennis courts, making Acadia the place to live, work and play tennis.
